## ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

The MSPP is an intensive, one-year, cohort-based program. The unique curriculum blends policy analysis, management, quantitative methods, and communication skills. The program runs from August through July, and students must be enrolled full-time.

You'll graduate fully prepared for an impactful career in policy analysis in any sector and field—including economic development, education, health, housing, and finance. You'll be ready to work for think tanks, policy consulting organizations, government agencies, consulting firms, foundations, and private sector companies—from New York City to cities around the globe.

## ELECTIVES

Electives are selected from an approved list of quantitative methods and topic electives. Topic electives can be clustered into specific policy areas (such as housing; education; health; transportation; international development; and inequality, race, and poverty).
