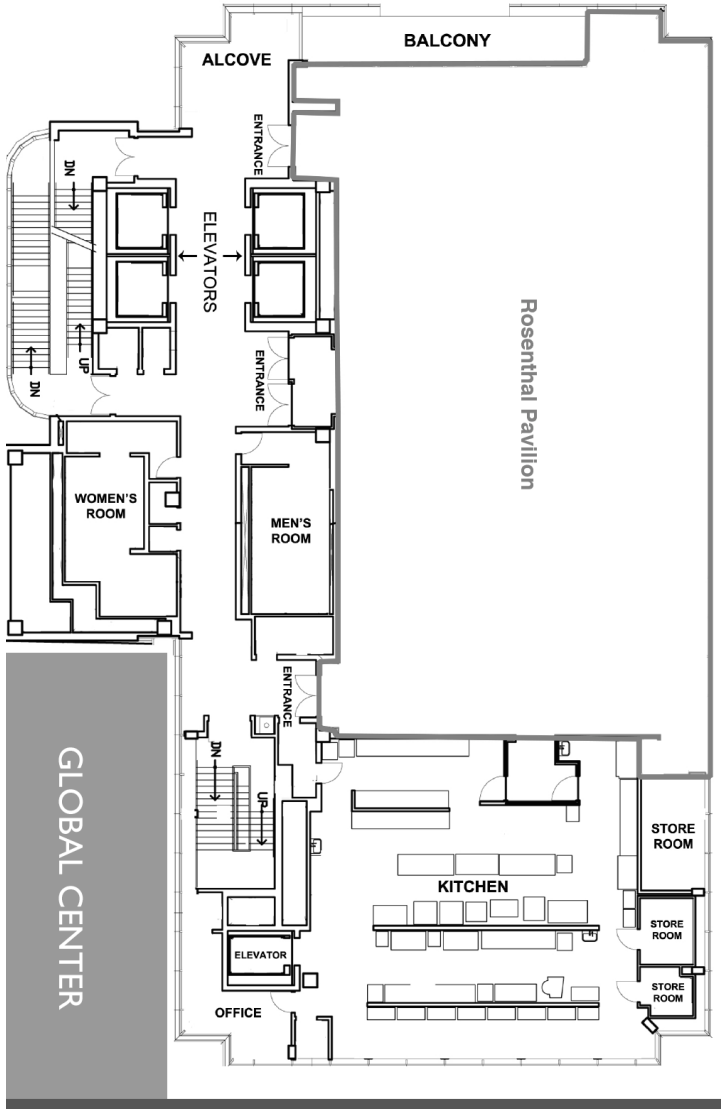

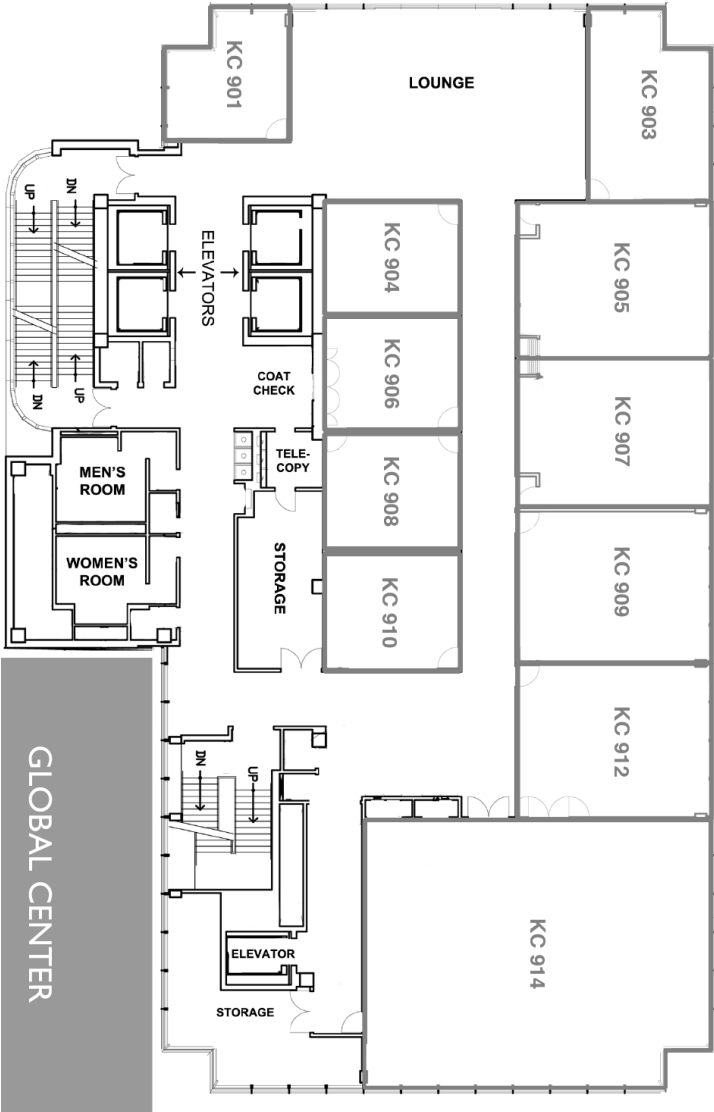

10TH FLOOR



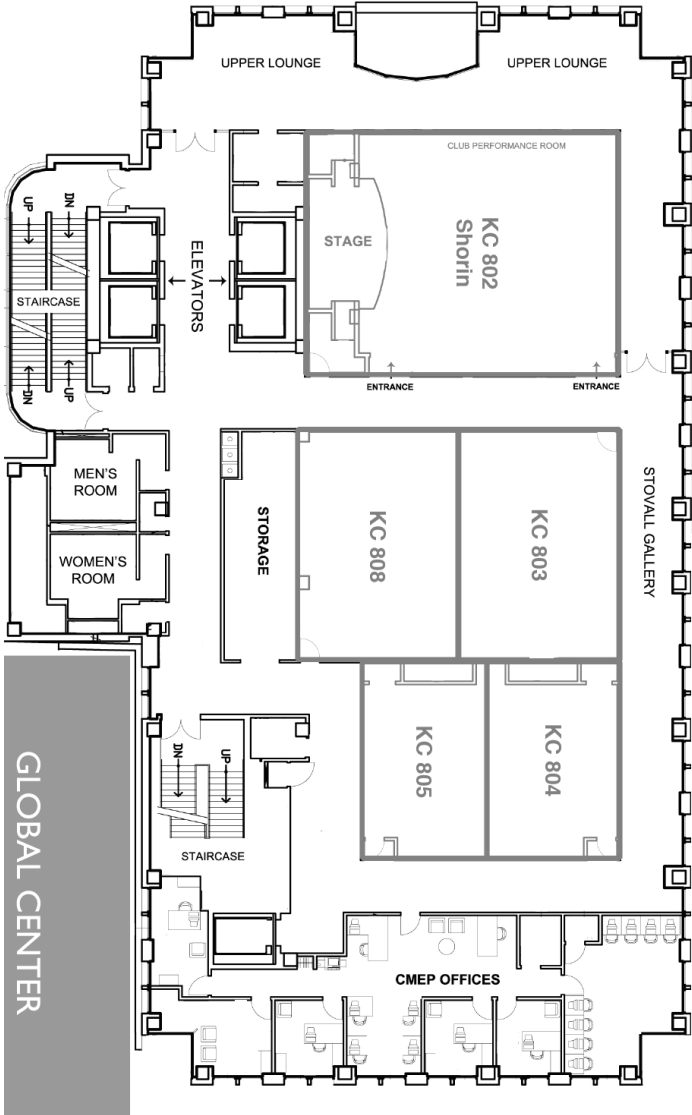
MAP | KIMMEL CENTER
