## Gaylon B. Alcaraz

Executive Director, Chicago Abortion Fund

Gaylon B. Alcaraz is an activist, organizer and champion of human rights. As the Executive Director of the Chicago Abortion Fund, she works within the reproductive justice/rights/health movement to advocate for low-income women seeking to control their reproductive freedom.

Among the many social justice accomplishments credited to Gaylon, she served as a founding board member of Affinity Community Services, a community organization that advocates for the rights of black lesbian and bisexual women in the Chicagoland area. During her board tenure at Affinity, she assumed increased leadership roles, across all areas of the organization's functions including the role of Vice President of the board, prior to the end of her final board service. Currently, she serves on the board of directors for Illinois Caucus for Adolescent Health. She is also a past board member of the Midwest Access Project.

For more than ten years, she has worked on behalf of sexual minority women, anti-violence, gender equity, health prevention, reproductive rights, as well as race and culture issues. Gaylon has consistently applied her knowledge in practice toward quality improvement, increased access, and by challenging frameworks that do not allow for the exploration of diversity across multiple dimensions when working with, and on behalf of diverse constituencies. These passionate beliefs have led her to advocate on behalf of all women, black lesbians and children.

Also a published writer and poet, Gaylon's first book publication, "tales of a woojiehead" was released in 2002. She has been previously published in the *Sun Times*, *Tribune*, *Defender*, *Streetwise* and *Venus Magazine* out of New York.

Born and raised in Chicago, Illinois she was awarded her BA and MA from DePaul University in 2008 and 2011. Gaylon begins her doctoral program at Roosevelt University in 2013.



## Tameeza Alibhai

**Policy Manager, AKDN, AKF-Afghanistan**

Tameeza Alibhai works for the Aga Khan Foundation conducting policy development and outreach for the Afghanistan Unit.

Prior to this she worked in management consulting for over 14 years delivering projects for multinational corporations both nationally and internationally.

Her primary areas of expertise include managing global business transformation projects, large-scale post-merger integration projects, optimizing and streamlining operations, and development of organizational governance.

Approximately four years ago she moved into the development sector working for organizations engaged in social and economic development, and humanitarian assistance.

Tameeza was born and bred in Kenya until moving to Dallas, Texas.



## Ramatu Bangura

Program Director, GELI, Sauti Yetu Center for African Women

Dr. Ramatu Bangura is the Program Director of the Girls' Empowerment and Leadership Initiative for the Sauti Yetu Center for African Women. She is responsible for the oversight of Sauti Yetu's youth programs; spearheading local and national advocacy around educational access for English Language Learners, early/forced marriage, and youth and female genital cutting; as well as raising funds and supervising all program staff.

Ramatu has dedicated nearly the last 15 years to advocacy and support of women and girls in vulnerable circumstances through the development of educational programming, informational campaigns and direct advocacy for survivors of sexual and family violence, immigrant women, and youth involved in the commercial sex trade.

Her doctoral dissertation, entitled *In Pursuit of Success: The Educational Identities and Decision-making of African Girls with Limited Formal Schooling* utilized African feminist perspectives to understand how immigrant girls whose education was truncated by conflict or poverty navigate schooling, college and decisions about marriage and motherhood.



## Sindy Marisol Benavides

**Director of Civic Engagement & Community Mobilization, League of United Latin American Citizens**

Sindy Marisol Benavides serves as the National Director for Civic Engagement and Mobilization for the League of United Latin American Citizens, the oldest Hispanic organization in the country.

She previously served as the Vice President of Field and Political Operations for Voto Latino and as Northern Virginia Political Director for the 2012 Kaine for Virginia Senatorial campaign. She has also served as the National Director of Community Outreach for the Democratic National Committee and Latino Liaison and Director of Board

Appointments for Governor Timothy M. Kaine.

Sindy received her Bachelor of Arts from Virginia State University in Petersburg, Virginia, where she studied Political Science with a minor in Spanish and graduated Valedictorian of her class. She also attended American University for her MA in International Affairs.

Sindy is an alumna of the Sorenson Political Leadership Program through the University of Virginia and the Virginia Executive Institute and Minority Political Leadership Institute through Virginia Commonwealth University. She is an alumna of the 2009 class of the National Hispana Leadership Institute. Sindy obtained a Certificate in Executive Management and Leadership from Harvard Kennedy School in April 2009 and attended the Center for Creative Leadership in July 2009. She was also named among the Top 20 People to Watch in 2009 by *Richmond* magazine and among the Top 20 Latina Women of Excellence in 2010 by *Hispanic Business* magazine. In 2010, Sindy was selected by the American Jewish Committee to travel to Israel with a delegation of 13 national Latina leaders.



## Kia Chatmon

**Development Officer, National Organization of Concerned Black Men**

Kia began her professional career in public service as a member of the Children's Defense Fund's Black Student Leadership Network and the Freedom School program. Under the direction of visionary leaders, she learned what it truly means to be a "servant leader."

Kia has continued her journey in the social sector working for both national and local organizations including: the DC Rape Crisis Center, Public Allies-DC, the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids and, most recently,

the National Organization of Concerned Black Men.

She gained deeper insight into what makes an effective organization by working with firms focused on building the capacity of nonprofits to reach their goals; and has shared this insight with smaller, grassroots organizations, acting as an independent consultant focused on program and fund development.

Kia is also involved with historical preservation efforts in her neighborhood, located in Washington, DC, acting as a "community historian." In this role, she works with her neighbors to chronicle the stories and accomplishments of its residents. These efforts include the creation of a brochure, book, heritage trail and a collection of oral histories from some of the neighborhood's most seasoned citizens.

Kia received her AB in Anthropology from Stanford University.



## Rosita Choy

**Director of Operations, National CAPACD**

Rosita Choy has worked on immigrant rights and social justice for a decade and half. She began her professional life as a bilingual Cantonese kindergarten teacher and a bilingual Spanish substitute teacher in the Oakland public schools in California, serving a diverse community of low-income students of color similar to the northeast Los Angeles neighborhood where she grew up.

Rosita transitioned from teaching to fundraising for a nonprofit community health center in California and later a domestic violence shelter in Massachusetts, both serving low-income Asian and Pacific Islander communities. She has stayed in nonprofit work ever since, gravitating increasingly toward advocacy and movement building until she found herself in Washington, DC, working for the American Friends Service Committee at the intersection of national policy, grassroots organizing and coalition building in regards to immigrant rights.

In addition, she has worked on Asian and Pacific Islander, women's and education issues in organizations such as Asian Health Services, the Massachusetts Immigrant and Refugee Advocacy Coalition, the National Immigration Law Center, Amnesty International and the American Association of University Women.

Currently Rosita is the director of operations at National CAPACD (Coalition for Asian Pacific American Community Development), located in Washington, DC, where she applies the lessons learned from her experiences in various organizations and coalitions and her experiences with varying functions from direct services to fundraising and from policy to organizational development.



## Elizabeth Clay Roy

**Chief Strategy Officer, Phipps Community Development Corporation**

Elizabeth Clay Roy has recently joined Phipps Community Development Corporation as the Chief Strategy Officer and will launch a new cradle to college pathway initiative in the South Bronx in partnership with Children's Aid Society.

From its founding in 2010, she was the Deputy Director of Opportunity Nation, a national campaign to promote economic opportunity and mobility. It is a coalition of over 250 organizations advancing opportunity for the rising generation through policy, research and community action.

Before joining Be the Change, Inc. she served in the Office of Governor Deval Patrick, as a Policy Advisor and then as Director of Grassroots Governance and Commonwealth Corps.

Elizabeth is the co-author of *Shaping Vibrant Cities*, a guidebook on effective community planning and political engagement for neighborhood organizations. It is based on community organizing work with Janaagraha Centre for Citizenship and Democracy in Bangalore, India.

In her role with ABFE, Erika has led major projects, including:


- SMART Investing, a new initiative focused on increasing access for minority- and women-owned investment management firms to opportunities for foundation endowment management; and

In this capacity, she oversees the implementation of three workforce development and college retention programs, which include the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) Motivating Undergraduates in Science and Technology (MUST) Project, and the One Stop Shopping Initiative (OSSI) as well as the National Nuclear

Security Administration (NNSA) Leadership Project. Iliana joined the then Hispanic College Fund in 2011 to lead the development and implementation of the NNSA Leadership Project as its Project Manager.

Previously, as the Assistant Director of Georgetown University's Carroll Fellows Initiative, the university's flagship program for its most academically talented and ambitious undergraduates, Iliana managed outreach, recruitment and retention. She oversaw program development and advised over 120 students. She also managed the Lisa J. Raines Summer Research Fellowship and the Arrupe Scholarship for Peace.

### Program Director, Day One

Margarita attended Georgetown University where she majored in English and minored in Women's Studies. She attended the George Washington University School of Law where she participated in the Domestic Violence Legal Clinic, representing victims/survivors of domestic violence obtaining orders of protection from the DV Court in Washington, DC.

She was the recipient of the Maurice C. Shapiro Public Service Fellowship in her third year of law school, which funded her work at Ayuda Inc., representing asylum seekers in deportation

proceedings in Washington, DC.

Her introduction to the NYC-based DV advocates community was as an intern at the Community Law Offices of Legal Aid, Domestic Violence Unit, located in East Harlem.

Upon graduating from law school, Margarita was awarded an Equal Justice Works Fellowship to create a legal clinic for indigent Spanish-speaking mental health consumers in NYC. For three years, Margarita represented mental health consumers in a multidisciplinary setting combining social and legal services, and she represented clients in a wide array of civil legal issues, including disability benefits, housing, public assistance and Medicaid/Medicare.

After this, Margarita went on to serve the primarily Latina/o immigrant population of Washington Heights/Inwood at the Northern Manhattan Improvement Corporation (NMIC). At NMIC, Margarita defended tenants against evictions and represented survivors of domestic violence in family court and housing proceedings as well as filing DV-based immigration petitions.

Margarita became the Program Director at Day One in 2010, where she supervises programming to address intimate partner violence, sexual assault and stalking among youth. At Day One, Margarita has led the development of a progressive interdisciplinary model combining social and legal services as well as preventive community education.

In 2012, the New York City Employment and Training Coalition awarded her and the Academy the Employer/Community Based Organization Partnership Award, which recognizes an employer and organization that have established an innovative or high-impact program model for hiring and/or job retention. Nathalie enjoys the complexity of work within a public-private venture. She has strategized fiscal year programming and policy decisions with the New York City Housing Authorities VP of Strategy & Development and Adult Education Director. ## Jovian Zayne Irvin

**Managing Director, Regional Talent Recruitment and Strategy,  
Teach For America**

Jovian Zayne Irvin has always been a change agent. At an early age she became a leader among her peers – serving as high school Student Body Vice President and President, and ultimately as the first African-American woman to be elected as a senior class president at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

After leveraging her leadership and advocacy skills in a job at the Presidential Classroom in Washington, DC, she began her career in marketing with Black and Decker and was quickly recognized for her

high performance. Despite this success, however, she could not suppress her longtime passion for improving education within her generation. That urge led Jovian to Teach For America (TFA), where she helped manage a number of large projects, including their “Sponsor A Teacher” campaign and the star-studded “Teach For America Week,” where celebrities and other notable individuals taught guest lessons in TFA classrooms. Jovian is now working as a senior leader focused on human capital development as a Managing Director of Talent Recruitment and Strategy.

A modern day renaissance woman, Jovian also showcases her creativity and leadership as the creator of the podcast “Side A Fries,” the widely loved blog, “Word Up, Haay!” and as an Official Chasemaster for Janelle Monáe and The Wondaland Arts Society. Jovian was named to Hello Beautiful’s “30 under 30” list, and was the director of Thrival’s 3.0 and 5.0 at the Idea Festival featuring dynamic speakers and performers including scientist Howard Bloom, tight-rope walker Philipe Petitie, Grammy-nominated artist Janelle Monáe, Star Trek’s Nichelle Nichols, and award-winning producer, Jon Landau. Director, Moral Courage Project, NYU Wagner

Irshad Manji is founder of the Moral Courage Project, a multi-media program that guides individuals to take thoughtful risks for life-changing rewards.

Her newest venture is Moral Courage TV, a YouTube channel that tells the stories of people around the world who are standing up when others want them to sit down.

As a Muslim reformer, Irshad puts moral courage into practice. Her latest book, *Allah, Liberty & Love*, is a how-to guide on reconciling faith and freedom in our repressive world. *O, The Oprah Magazine*, describes *Allah, Liberty & Love* as “an audacious, thoughtful call for people of all religions to move beyond hate, fear and intolerance.”

Irshad's previous book is the global bestseller, *The Trouble with Islam Today: A Muslim's Call for Reform in Her Faith*. In between her books, she spearheaded the Emmy-nominated PBS documentary, *Faith Without Fear*.

Ultimately, Irshad's mission is engage people about their wholeness, especially those who feel limited by cultural, religious or societal norms. She aligns with questioning individuals, giving them a platform to share their stories so that they can inspire others.



## Sonia M. Ospina

**Faculty Director, Research Center for Leadership in Action and Professor of Public Management and Policy, NYU Wagner**

Dr. Sonia M. Ospina is a Professor of Public Management and Policy at NYU's Robert F. Wagner Graduate School of Public Service. She is also a co-founder and the Faculty Director of NYU Wagner's Research Center for Leadership in Action.

A sociologist by training, she applies organization and management theories to public problem solving and governance, in the United States and in Latin America. These interests are reflected in three areas of scholarship: leadership and social transformation (exploring the civil society side of governance); change in public management systems (exploring the State side of governance); and the craft of qualitative research (exploring research solutions to studying these areas and their intersections).

She is the author of numerous referred journal articles and book chapters on these areas, and has produced six books, among them, *Illusions of Opportunity: Employee Expectations and Workplace Inequality* (1996), *Results-oriented Evaluation for a Modern and Democratic Public Management: Latin American Experiences* (2003, in Spanish; co-authored), and *Advancing Relational Leadership Research: A Conversation Across Perspectives* (2012, co-edited).

Over the past decade, Sonia directed a Ford Foundation-sponsored multi-year, national research project, partnering with 92 social change organizations in the United States to study their leadership and contributions to democracy.

Sonia has been the President of the Inter-American Network of Public Administration Education (INPAE), and a member of the Executive Boards of the Association of Public Policy and Management (APPAM) and the National Association of Schools of Public Affairs and Administration (NASPAA). She sits in several international boards on public management and higher education in various Latin American countries and was recently elected Fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration in the United States.

Presently, she is co-editor of the *Journal of Public Administration Research and Theory*, co-editor of the book review section of *Public Administration Review*, and member of the editorial board of several other academic journals, including four in Latin America.

She has a PhD in Sociology and a Master's in Public Policy and Management from the State University of New York at Stony Brook.

She uses her extensive training as an actor, writer and producer in the theater combined with her ongoing work in education reform to coach senior education leaders (clients include Explore Charter Network, D79 School District (NYC DOE), Broad Superintendents' Academy) who work on behalf of children and families living in low-income communities on how to use storytelling and public speaking techniques to inspire people to take action and make change in their communities.

She also works on staff at Teach For America as the Director of Voice and Speech Coaching supporting senior leaders (the CEOs, senior VPs and regional Executive Directors) in the organization to communicate complex messages effectively with their own staff and external audiences. She runs voice workshops for staff tailored to their roles and the skills and techniques they want to acquire.

Deepa is the co-founder and a member of the Board of Directors of Rising Circle Theater Collective, a theater company dedicated to developing and producing the unheard stories of people of color on the American stage. As the Artistic Director of her theater company for 12 years, she oversaw the development and/or production of 20 original plays written by playwrights of color, the reconstitution and development of a new Board, the expansion of programming for Q Up, a five-day arts intensive for Asian American high school girls from Queens, the development of Rising Circle's, INKTank, a 12-week writers lab for writers of color, currently in its 4th year, and a new play development program called The Refinery, bringing plays from page to the stage. All of these programs were/are supported by grants from the New York City Department of Cultural Affairs (2010-present), The Asian Women's Giving Circle (Q Up), The Nancy Quinn Fund (INKTank 2010-present) and the Puffin Foundation (INKTank/PlayRISE 2010).

Deepa is a 1992 Teach For America alumna and taught 6th and 8th grade English for 3 years in Baltimore City Public Schools. She has lived in New York for 18 years and has taught writing and theater to students of all ages living in low-income communities across the city of New York both in school and for after-school programs. Deepa continues to act in both television and film. She is currently writing her fourth full-length play, Flight, which was mounted as a staged reading sponsored by the Kupferberg Center for the Arts in June 2013.
